Cyber security: balancing risk and reward with confidence	<a href="#">Here</a>	This guidance will help non-executive directors talk with board colleagues about cyber security risks . It offers non-executive directors the main questions to ask to help their company prosper in the information economy age.
CPNI – Passport to Good Security for Senior Executives	<a href="#">Here</a>	CPNI has produced the Passport to Good Security for Senior Executives. It sets out strategic headlines for best practice and provides relevant prompts for the actions you need to take as part of your strategy. It will help you to identify, assess and mitigate the threats to your organisation.
UK cyber security: the role of insurance	<a href="#">Here</a>	This report highlights the role insurers and insurance can play in reducing cyber security risk. It was jointly published by the government and Marsh, and is the result of close working between the government and the insurance sector.
Cyber governance health check: 2014	<a href="#">Here</a>	The cyber governance health check uses results from the ‘tracker’, an online tool that assesses and reports levels of cyber security awareness and preparedness in FTSE 350 companies. This report contains results from the 2014 cyber governance health check and compares results with the 2013 report. Confidential individual benchmarking reports are also provided for each participating company. This allows companies to compare their governance behaviours with others and helps them to identify their different vulnerabilities. This report is part of the government’s National Cyber Security programme, which aims to make the UK one of the safest places in the world to do business in cyber space.
